# **Dublin, London & Paris**

"The use of traveling is to regulate imagination by reality, and instead of thinking how things may be, to see them as they are." —Samuel Johnson

### History

#### **Dublin:**

Walk down the brick-lined Grafton Street, the city's premier shopping street; visit the striking greenery of St. Stephen's Green, simply called Stephen's Green by local Dubliners; and make your way through Temple Bar, Dublin's hippest neighborhood.

Pass by the residence of the president of Ireland as you journey through **Phoenix Park**. Continue down **O'Connell Street**, a wide, tree-lined avenue named for one of Ireland's most famous nationalists. Then see the famous **doors of Dublin** as you ride through the city's elegant Georgian squares. You'll also pass an **ancient Viking site** (the Vikings founded Dublin in the 9<sup>th</sup> century).

## Island of Anglesey:

While on the island, visit either Beaumaris Castle, a fortification dating from the 13th century that once guarded the Menai Straits, or Conwy Castle, Edward I's medieval masterpiece.

#### Stratford:

"It is something, I thought, to have seen the dust of Shakespeare." Discover what inspired Washington Irving's famous words as you tour **Stratford-upon-Avon**, where Shakespeare was born, raised and buried. Step back into the Elizabethan age as you visit the half-timbered home in which the Bard was born, as well as see the old-fashioned English gardens and orchard of **Anne Hathaway's cottage**, a picturesque thatched farmhouse where Shakespeare's wife spent her childhood.

#### London:

Stroll through the heart of London on our walking tour, which begins along the banks of the River Thames. These shadowy waters gave the city its name, which derives from Llyn-Dyn, Celtic for "city of the lake." Walk along the Strand and see the spot considered to be London's geographic center; all measurements of distances to London end here. Enter Trafalgar Square and pause at Nelson's Column, built to commemorate his 1805 victory in the Battle of Trafalgar. You will also see Canada House, built between 1824 and 1827 to designs by Sir Robert Smirke, the architect of the British Museum. The Canadian government acquired the building in 1923. During the London Blitz a bomb fell near the building, only 20 yards away from future Canadian Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson who was the secretary to the high commissioner at the time. Continue on to Leicester Square, where duelists once fought to the death. Then saunter through London's tiny Chinatown. Your walk ends at chic Covent Garden, where you'll enjoy watching street performers (or "buskers") amuse the lively crowds.

A local guide leads you on a panoramic tour of London. Begin in **Grosvenor Square**, which is sometimes called "Little America" because it's the site of the U.S. embassy and the house where Eisenhower once lived. Continue to **Hyde Park Corner**, located at the southeast corner of Hyde Park, one of London's largest parks. At bustling **Piccadilly Circus**, the intersection of five busy streets, check out the bright lights and big-city displays, before heading to Trafalgar Square. Pass **Speaker's Corner**, where anyone with something to say is invited to speak his or her mind. Snap a photo of the **Houses of Parliament** and continue along London's South Bank for views of the famous **Tower of London** and **London Bridge**. The Tower of London was begun during the reign of William the Conqueror (1066–87). The Tower is in fact a castle, and has served over the years as a palace, observatory, storehouse and mint. It is perhaps most famous for its morbid past as a prison and site of execution. Finally, witness a London tradition—the **Changing of the Guard at Buckingham Palace** (subject to scheduling).

Optional Excursion to Westminster Abbey: Site of a millennium's worth of royal coronations, Westminster Abbey is yours to explore on this guided tour. Learn about the Gothic church's storied past (William the Conqueror was crowned here in 1066) as your guide reveals monuments, paintings and stained glass windows. Continue on to St. Martin-in-the-Fields where you will make brass rubbings of medieval icons.

#### Paris:

Discover the city on the Seine, beginning with the imposing **Arc de Triomphe**, commemorating Napoleon's Grande Armée. The triumphal arch is in honour of those who fought for France, in particular, those who fought during the Napoleonic Wars. Engraved on the inside and at the top of the arch are all of the names of the generals and wars fought. There are inscriptions in the ground underneath the vault of the arch which include the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier from World War I where the Memorial Flame burns.

Take a drive down the elegant **Champs-Élysées** to the **Place de la Concorde**. The 3300-year-old pink granite obelisk with the gilded top in the middle of Place de la Concorde once stood in the Temple of Ramses at Thebes (today's Luxor) and was given to France in 1831 by Muhammad Ali, viceroy and pasha of Egypt. The female statues adorning the four corners of the square represent France's eight largest cities.

Pass the Conciergerie, where prisoners of the Revolution spent their final days, and see Les Invalides, Louis XIV's grand retirement home for wounded soldiers. You'll also see the École Militaire, where Napoleon graduated to lieutenant and was told he'd go far if circumstances allowed. Marvel at the Eiffel Tower – the 6,000-ton centerpiece for the 1889 World's Fair. You'll hear the story of how this impressive—but once highly controversial—symbol of Paris was spared the wrecking ball in 1909. Pass the Opéra Garnier, where the famous Phantom of the Opera haunted his dear Christine, and marvel at Église de la Madeleine, designed as a temple of glory for Napoleon's army.

Optional Excursion to Versailles: Join a half-day excursion to Versailles, the elaborate palace of Louis XIV. Here, the Sun King held court in the most lavish style imaginable. At one point, 1,000 nobles were attended by 4,000 servants inside the palace, while 15,000 soldiers and servants inhabited the annexes. Stroll through the elegantly landscaped gardens designed by André Le Nôtre, tour the State Apartments of the King himself, walk through the historic Hall of Mirrors where the treaty ending WWI was signed, admire the ornate décor of the State Apartments of the Queen, and enjoy free time for lunch.

## English

#### Dublin:

For a city of only 1 million people, Dublin has offered the world a disproportionately large number of great literary works. See what inspired writers such as **Joyce, Beckett** and **Yeats** during your guided tour of Ireland's capital, scenically situated between Dun Laoghaire (pronounced "dun leery") and the rocky peaks of Howth Head. Your tour also includes a visit to **Trinity College**, established by Queen Elizabeth I in 1592 (alumni include Samuel Beckett and Jonathan Swift). In the Long Room of the Old Library, view the illuminated 8th-century **Book of Kells**, written by Irish monks and found buried in the ground in 1007. You'll also see a harp that originally belonged to the famous Irish king Brian Boru.

### Art

### Paris:

Built to defend the city in the 13th century, the **Louvre** today safeguards one of the world's greatest art collections. Enter the museum through world-renowned architect I.M. Pei's glass pyramid, constructed in 1989. Inside, discover priceless antiquities from Asia, Greece and Rome. You'll also see precious objects from the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, as well as iconic European paintings such as the *Mona Lisa*. Artists Edgar Degas, Henri Matisse, Claude Monet, Pierre-Auguste Renoir, and Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec have all called Paris home.

### Religion

#### **Dublin:**

Ride past the banks of the River Liffey to the 800-year-old St. Patrick's Cathedral, built to honor the patron saint of Ireland, who brought Christianity to the country in the 5th century. Jonathan Swift once served as dean of St. Patrick's Cathedral.

### London:

Stroll across the Millennium Bridge for an orientation of St. Paul's Cathedral, the magnificent 17th-century Baroque church designed by Sir Christopher Wren. Many important national and royal ceremonies are held here.

#### Paris:

Your walking tour of Paris centers around the **Île de la Cité**, considered the birthplace of Paris. This island surrounded entirely by the Seine has been inhabited since the 3rd century B.C. and was the political and religious center of France for centuries. Île de la Cité houses three of Paris' most important buildings: **Notre Dame Cathedral**; the **Conciergerie**, Paris' first prison; and **St. Chapelle**, the Gothic Catholic church.

Built between 1163 and 1361 over the remains of an ancient Roman temple, it was at **Notre Dame Cathedral** that Napoleon crowned himself emperor in 1804. Victor Hugo once described the sculptured façade of Notre Dame as "a vast symphony in stone." Hugo's novel *The Hunchback of Notre Dame* helped inspire a 23-year restoration of the cathedral that began in 1841. Step inside to admire the stained-glass rose windows and seemingly weightless vaulted ceilings.


