Custodial: All expenses related to activities undertaken to keep the school environment and maintenance shops clean and safe.

Maintenance: All expenses associated with the repair, replacement, enhancement and minor construction of buildings, grounds and equipment components. This includes regular and preventative maintenance undertaken to ensure components reach or exceed their life cycle and the repair of broken components. Maintenance expenses exclude operational costs related to

expensed IMR & Modular Unit relocations, as they are reported on separately.

Utilities & Telecommunications: All expenses related to electricity, natural gas and other heating fuels, sewer and water and all forms of telecommunications.

Expensed IMR & Modular Unit Relocation & Lease Pmts: All operational expenses associated with non-capitalized Infrastructure Maintenance Renewal projects, modular unit (portable) relocation, and payments on leased facilities.

Facility Planning & Operations Administration: All expenses related to the administration of operations and maintenance including (but not limited to) contract administration, clerical functions, negotiations, supervision of employees

& contractors, school facility planning & project 'administration', administration of joint-use agreements, and all expenses related to ensuring compliance with health and safety standards,

codes and government regulations.

Supported Capital & Debt Services: All expenses related to supported capital assets amortization and interest on supported capital debt.

1. AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

Medicine Hat School District No. 76 ("the District") delivers education programs under the authority of the School Act, Revised Statues of Alberta 2000, Chapter S-3.

The District receives funding for instruction and support under Education Grants Regulation (AR 120/2008). The regulation allows for the setting of conditions and use of grant monies. The District is limited on certain funding allocations and administration expenses.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with CICA Canadian PSAS. The financial statements have, in management's opinion, been properly prepared within reasonable limits of materiality and within the framework of the significant accounting policies summarized below:

i. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and that are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. These short-term investments have a maturity of three months or less at acquisition and are held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments rather than for investing.

ii. ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable are shown net of allowance for doubtful accounts.

iii. PORTFOLIO INVESTMENTS

The District has investments in mutual funds that have no maturity date or a maturity greater than three months. Portfolio investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market are recorded at fair value and the associated transaction costs are expensed upon initial recognition. The change in the fair value is recognized in the Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses as a remeasurement gain or loss until the portfolio investments are derecognized. Upon derecognition, the accumulated remeasurement gains or losses associated with the derecognized portfolio investments are reversed and reclassified to the Statement of Operations.

Impairment is defined as a loss in value of a portfolio investment that is other than a temporary decline and is included in the Statement of Operations. In the case of an item in the fair value category, a reversal of any net remeasurement gains recognized in previous reporting periods up to the amount of the write-down is reported in the Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses. A subsequent increase in value would be recognized on the Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses and realized on the Statement of Operations only when sold.

Detailed information regarding portfolio investments is disclosed in Note 5.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

iv. TANGIBLE CAPITAL ASSETS

The following criteria apply:

- Tangible capital assets acquired or constructed are recorded at cost, including amounts
 directly related to the acquisition, design, construction, development, or betterment of the
 asset. Cost also includes overhead directly attributable to construction as well as interest
 costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of the asset.
- Donated tangible capital assets are recorded at their fair market value at the date of donation, except in circumstances where fair value cannot be reasonably determined, when they are then recognized at nominal value. Transfers of tangible capital assets from related parties are recorded at original cost less accumulated amortization.
- Work-in-progress is recorded as an acquisition to the applicable asset class at substantial completion.
- Sites and buildings are written down to residual value when conditions indicate they no longer
 contribute to the ability of the School District to provide services or when the value of future
 economic benefits associated with the sites and buildings are less than their net book value.
 For supported assets, the write-downs are accounted for as reductions to Expended Deferred
 Capital Revenue.
- Buildings that are demolished or destroyed are written-off.
- Tangible capital assets with costs in excess of \$5,000 are capitalized.
- Leases that, from the point of view of the lessee, transfer substantially all the benefits and risks incident to ownership of the property to the Board are considered capital leases. These are accounted for as an asset and an obligation. Capital lease obligations are recorded at the present value of the minimum lease payments excluding executor costs, e.g., insurance, maintenance costs, etc. The discount rate used to determine the present value of the lease payments is the lower of the District's rate for incremental borrowing or the interest rate implicit in the lease. A schedule of repayments and amount of interest on the leases is provided in Note 9.
- Tangible capital assets are amortized over their estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis, at the following rates:

Buildings25-50 yearsEquipment5-10 yearsVehicles5-10 yearsComputer Hardware & Software3 to 10 years

v. DEFFERED REVENUE

Deferred revenue includes contributions received for operations which have stipulations that meet the definition of a liability per *Public Sector Accounting Standard (PSAS) PS 3200.* These contributions are recognized by the District once it has met all eligibility criteria to receive the contributions. When stipulations are met, deferred revenue is recognized as revenue in the fiscal year in a manner consistent with the circumstances and evidence used to support the initial recognition of the contributions received as a liability.

Deferred revenue also includes contributions for capital expenditures, unexpended and expended:

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

- Unexpended Deferred Capital Revenue represent externally restricted supported capital funds provided for a specific capital purpose received or receivable by the District, but the related expenditure has not been made at year-end. These contributions must also have stipulations that meet the definition of a liability per PS 3200 when expended.
- Expended Deferred Capital Revenue represent externally restricted supported capital funds
 that have been expended but have yet to be amortized over the useful life of the related
 capital asset. Amortization over the useful life of the related capital asset is due to certain
 stipulations related to the contributions that require that the District use the asset in a
 prescribed manner over the life of the associated asset.

vi. EMPLOYEE FUTURE BENEFITS

The District provides certain post-employment benefits including vested and non-vested benefits for certain employees pursuant to certain contracts and union agreements.

The District accrues its obligations and related costs including both vested and non-vested benefits under employee future benefit plans. Benefits include multi-employer defined-benefit retirement plans, vested or accumulating sick leave, early retirement, retirement/severance, jobtraining and counseling, post-employment benefit continuation, vacation, overtime and various qualifying compensated absences.

vii. ASSET RETIREMENT OBLIGATIONS

The District has determined that it has a conditional asset retirement obligation relating to certain school sites. These obligations will be discharged in the future by funding through the Alberta Government. The District believes that there is insufficient information to estimate the fair value of the asset retirement obligation because the settlement date or the range of potential settlement dates has not been determined and information is not available to apply an expected present value technique.

viii. OPERATING AND CAPITAL RESERVES

Certain amounts are internally or externally restricted for future operating or capital purposes. Transfers to and from reserves are recorded when approved by the Board of Trustees. Capital reserves are restricted to capital purposes and may only be used for operating purposes with approval by the Minister of Education. Reserves are disclosed in the Schedule of Changes in Accumulated Surplus.

ix. REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue is recognized on an accrual basis as follows:

Instruction and support allocations are recognized in the year to which they relate.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Fees for services related to courses and programs are recognized as revenue when such courses and programs are delivered.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable. Contributions in-kind are recorded at fair market value when reasonably determinable.

Externally restricted contributions are deferred and recognized as revenue in the period in which the restriction is complied with.

Externally restricted capital allocations from the province or other agencies are recorded as deferred capital allocations until the amount is invested in capital assets. Amounts invested representing funded capital assets are then transferred to unamortized capital allocations. Unamortized capital allocations are recognized as amortization of capital allocations revenue in the periods which the related amortization expense of the funded capital asset is recorded.

Volunteers contribute a considerable number of hours per year to various schools, which are within the school board to ensure that certain programs are delivered, such as kindergarten, lunch services and the raising of school generated funds. Because of the difficulty of compiling these hours and the fact that these services are not otherwise purchased, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

x. EXPENSES

Expenses are reported on an accrual basis. The cost of all goods consumed and services received during the year is expensed.

Allocation of Costs

- Actual salaries of personnel assigned to two or more programs are allocated based on the time spent in each program.
- Employee benefits and allowances are allocated to the same programs, and in the same proportions, as the individual's salary.
- Supplies and services are allocated based on actual program identification.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

xi. PENSIONS

Pension costs included in these statements comprise the cost of employer contributions for current service of employees during the year.

The current service and past service costs of the Alberta Teacher Retirement Fund are met by contributions by active members and the Government of Alberta. Under the terms of the Teachers Pension Plan Act, the District does not make pension contributions for certified staff. The Government portion of the current service contribution to the Alberta Teachers Retirement Fund on behalf of the District is included in both revenues and expenses. For the school year ended August 31, 2014, the amount contributed by the Government was \$4,468,306 (2013 - \$4,137,742).

The school board participates in the multi-employer pension plan, Local Authorities Pension Plan, and does not report on any unfunded liabilities. The expense for this pension plan is equivalent to the annual contributions of \$605,381 for the year ended August 31, 2014 (2013 - \$604,538). At December 31, 2013, the Local Authorities Pension Plan reported an actuarial deficiency of \$4,861,516,000 (2012 deficiency of \$4,977,303,000).

The District participates in the Alberta School Boards Association Supplemental Integrated Pension Plan (SIPP) for Senior Management. The expenses for this pension plan are equivalent to the annual contributions of \$27,456 for the year ended August 31, 2014 (2013 - \$27,003).

xii. PROGRAM REPORTING

The District's operations have been segmented as follows:

- **ECS-Grade 12 Instruction**: The provision of Early Childhood Services education and grades 1 12 instructional services that fall under the basic public education mandate.
- Plant Operations and Maintenance: The operation and maintenance of all school buildings and maintenance shop facilities.
- **Transportation**: The provision of regular and special education bus services (to and from school), whether contracted or board operated, including transportation facilities.
- **Board & System Administration**: The provision of board governance and system-based / central office administration.
- External Services: All projects, activities, and services offered outside the public education mandate for ECS children and students in grades 1-12. Services offered beyond the mandate for public education are to be self-supporting, and Alberta Education funding may not be utilized to support these programs.

The allocation of revenues and expenses are reported by program, source, and object on the Schedule of Program Operations.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

xiii. SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT FUNDS

Contributions to scholarship endowment funds must be held in perpetuity in accordance with the agreement with the donor.

Reinvestment of the endowment principal represents a direct increase to accumulated surplus. The remaining income earned on endowment principal is recognized as deferred revenue or as revenue in the year to the extent that stipulations have been met.

Unrealized gains and losses associated with the endowment are recorded in the Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses.

xiv. TRUSTS UNDER ADMINISTRATION

The District has property that has been transferred or assigned to it to be administered or directed by a trust agreement or statute. The District holds title to the property for the benefit of the beneficiary.

Trusts under administration have been excluded from the financial reporting of the District. Trust balances can be found in Note 17.

xv. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

A contract establishing a financial instrument creates, at its inception, rights and obligations to receive or deliver economic benefits. The financial assets and financial liabilities portray these rights and obligations in the financial statements. The School District recognizes a financial instrument when it becomes a party to a financial instrument contract.

The District classifies its financial instruments into one of the following categories: held for trading (assets and liabilities), assets available for sale, loans and receivables, assets held to maturity and other financial liabilities. Held for trading financial assets and financial liabilities are acquired for resale prior to maturity or are financial assets and liabilities, designed as such by the District. Held to maturity assets are non-derivative financial assets with a fixed maturity, which the District intends to hold to maturity. Available for sale financial assets are those non-derivative financial assets, which are so designated by the District or that do not fall into another category. All financial instruments are measured at fair value on initial recognition. Transaction costs are included in the initial carrying amount of financial instruments except for held for trading items in which case they are expensed as incurred. Measurement in subsequent periods depends on the classification of the financial instrument.

The financial instruments of the District consist of cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, portfolio investments, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, deferred revenue, employee future benefits liabilities and debt. The business risks associated with financial instruments are categorized as price, credit, liquidity and cash flow risks. It is management's opinion that the District is not exposed to significant price (comprised of currency, interest rate, and market risk), credit, liquidity or cash flow risks arising from these financial instruments.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Financial assets and liabilities held for trading are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognized in net income. Financial assets available for sale are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognized in changes in net assets.

Assets held to maturity, loans and receivables and other financial liabilities are subsequently amortized using the effective interest rate method.

The District has classified its cash and cash equivalents as held for trading, which are measured at fair value. Accounts receivable are classified as loans and receivables and after initial fair value measurement; they are measured at amortized cost. Accounts payable and other liabilities, and long-term debt are classified as other financial liabilities.

xvi. MEASUREMENT UNCERTAINITY

The precise determination of many assets and liabilities is dependent on future events. As a result, the preparation of financial statements for a period involves the use of estimates and approximations, which have been made using careful judgment. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates relate to the potential impairment of assets, rates for amortization and estimated employee future benefits.

The District offers an early retirement incentive plan to all eligible Teachers to a maximum of \$25,000. To be eligible, teachers must have been under contract for a minimum of 10 consecutive years and have achieved a Teacher Retirement Fund Index of 85 after turning 55 years of age. If the 85 factor is reached prior to age 55, they become eligible at age 55. This is an event driven termination benefit and as such, no accrual is required.

The District's contract with the Teachers Union allows for an auto renew 90 day sick plan policy. As the sick leave automatically renews, there is no accrual as it is an event driven compensated absence that does not vest or accumulate.

Effective September 1, 2013, the contract for the Educational Assistants, Custodial and Clerical staff came into effect which has an accrual of sixty-five days.

9. LONG TERM DEBT

i. DEBENTURE DEBT – SUPPORTED

The debenture debt bears interest at 9.250% due March 2015. Security is represented by school buildings held by the District. The debenture debt is fully supported by Alberta Finance. Debenture payments due over the next five years and beyond are:

15. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

- i. The District is a member of an Urban School Insurance Consortium (USIC). A portion of the premiums paid each year represents equity contributions to the insurance fund. These payments have been recorded as expenses in the financial statements as the value of equity is subject to liability claims. As at August 31, 2014 the District's equity portion is \$133,719 (2013 \$99,987)
- ii. The District, in conduct of its normal activities, is a defendant in various legal proceedings. While the ultimate outcome of these proceedings cannot be predicted at this time, it is the opinion of the District's administration that adequate provision for these proceedings has been made in the District accounts. It is believed that the resolution of the proceedings will not have a material effect on the financial position of the District; however, should any additional losses result from the resolutions of these proceedings, such amounts would be expensed as the related amounts become known to the District.
- **iii.** The District is contingently liable for corporate credit cards issued with a combined authorized credit limit of \$520,650 (2013 \$506,650).

25. RETROSPECTIVE CORRECTION OF ERRORS

There was a retrospective correction of three prior year errors. These errors include:

- i. The estimated CEU revenue and receivable balances were understated by \$276,342. The confirmation of the balance for the CEU receivable was received by the District prior to the audit report date of November 24, 2013 and therefore, should have been adjusted in the financial statements to reflect the actual receivable.
- ii. In June 2013, the District became the banker board for the South East Regional Collaborative Service Delivery. The District received \$100,000 which was incorrectly recorded as revenue for the District in the 2012/13 year-end.
- iii. The District overstated the accrued vacation liability in the 2012/13 year-end by \$185,000.
