MHHS Girls' Basketball

Congratulations to the coaches and players of the Medicine Hat High School Girls' basketball team who won the provincial championship. MHHS Varsity Girls Basketball team went undefeated in 4A Zones playoffs winning gold by beating #1 ranked Cardston and #2 ranked Raymond then went on to win the 4A Provincial Championship in the toughest draw possible...they beat the home team Jasper Place during the school day on Thursday in front of a packed gym of Jasper Place students, then the beat the #1, #2, and #3 ranked teams to win Gold. The top 16 teams go to provincials and they played the toughest 4. They went in ranked #10. The team's efforts throughout the playoffs were outstanding and their hard work and dedication were rewarded.

Thank you to MHHS staff for their support with donations to pay for the girls' meal prior to the big game. The support of everyone at the school for the team was greatly appreciated.

Crescent Heights High School

a) This year's CHHS Viking Varsity girls had one of the best years in the last number of years. The year started out very slowly because of some injuries to key players and just not being very healthy as a team. As the year went on, the girls fought through the adversities and became a very competitive team in both league and tournament play.

We entered into seven tournaments and ended up being finalists in six and beating a lot of very good schools. We were ranked as honourable mention at the beginning of the year and ended up ranked 5th in the province. The team beat other city schools on

a regular basis in league play and won the SEBC League banner for the first time since 1997.

We attended zones to compete with six other teams that were ranked in the top ten in the province that were in our zone. We won our first game, but lost to the eventual provincial winners.

Overall it was a tremendous year for the Girls' Viking Basketball Program and for CHHS.

- b) Vikings Boy's Basketball The 2014-15 season for the Vikings was an important rebuilding year. The focus for this year was about player development and creating a culture that will inspire others, in the school, to become involved in Viking athletics. The team was led by captains Zack Wilson and Justin Nordlee, both playing in their final year. The Vikings were placed into top tournaments in the province including the District 4 Tournament in Calgary and the Super South Tournament in Medicine Hat, arguably the biggest tournaments in Alberta. While the Vikings overall record may not appear glamorous, the players developed in skill and determination. A core of young players, including Rylly Quirante, Adrian Glauser & Alex Glauser, will be looked upon to lead the Vikings next season. Coach Hamilton was extremely proud of how his team managed to overcome obstacles and remain a team that followed the motto Family, Academics, Basketball. The Vikings lost their semi-final zone play-off game to eventual champions W.R. Myers (Taber), but are ready to challenge for the zone title next year.
- c) Our boys and girls junior high teams all had successful years. We had a total of six teams, with approximately 65 players in our program, between the boys and girls teams. Our grade 9 teams both improved significantly over the course of the season. Our girls team attended 4J zones in Raymond and achieved their goal of defeating a higher seeded team in the tournament. Our younger teams were very strong this season. Both our boys and girls grade 7/8 teams captured their respective 'B' league championships. Most of the players on our grade 7 boys and girls teams had their first basketball experience this year. Much like our grade 9 teams, they did not win the championship, but their knowledge and skills improved considerably from the beginning of the season to the end as they started to learn the game.

Dr. Roy Wilson Learning Centre

- a) The Grade 7 "B" Boys Basketball team had a very successful first season at the Dr. Roy Wilson Learning Centre. Their skill development and knowledge of the game of basketball grew tremendously as the season progressed leading to a third place finish at the CHHS tournament. The boys worked hard all season long to create a "never quit" identity with a mind-set that no lead is too large to overcome. Their unselfish personalities led to plenty of exciting games that resulted in a handful of victories. These 20+ student athletes pushed each other every day in practice to become the best players that they could be, demonstrating what it takes to be a true T.E.A.M. (Together Everyone Achieves More). Congratulations boys!
- b) The Wilson Royals girls' basketball team had a successful first season! Every day the girls worked hard in practice to become better athletes. We focused on the skills of shooting, passing, dribbling, defense, and becoming a good teammate. The girls made it at goal to support their teammates on and off the court. As a team we practiced the agreements, and worked hard to always put our best effort forward in all situations. The girls' commitment and hard work lead them to many victories in both tournaments and league play. I am very proud of all of the athletes that participated in the Wilson Royals Basketball Program and am very excited to see them grow as athletes in the years to come!

Medicine Hat Christian School

a) Warriors Girls Basketball

The MHCS girls' basketball team was a young team who improved throughout the season. For tournaments, MHCS competed in the "B" level and were successful at this level. 1. MHHS Field Trip Request to Havre, Montana

Mr. Scott Howes, Vice-Principal and Football coach at Medicine Hat High School, is requesting permission for students on the Hawks Football team to travel to Havre, Montana on two separate occasions:

- 1) September 5, 2015
- 2) September 26, 2015

Separate Field Trip request forms are attached.

It is recommended that the Board approve, in principle, two field trips for students from Medicine Hat High School to travel to Havre, Montana on September 5, 2015 and September 26, 2015, subject to the following conditions:

- a] that the Secretary-Treasurer's Department give initial approval to the destination and that the submitted itinerary be approved;
- b] that the District's Student Waiver Forms be signed by all parents;
- c] that there be no cost to the Board, other than the cost of substitute teachers for approved supervising teachers traveling on the Field Trip;
- d] that any adults participating in the trip who are not designated supervisors be informed and sign a release that the Board does not accept any responsibility (liability or otherwise) as a result of their participation;
- e] that all students and designated chaperones are required to obtain the School District Travel Insurance (medical, trip cancellation/interruption and baggage).
- f] that criminal record checks be obtained for parent supervisors (non-district personnel);
- g] that the Principal/Teacher responsible continue to monitor and keep track of the travel advisories and ensure that students and parents are aware that the trip could be cancelled:
- h] that the Principal/Teacher comply with all criteria set out in Policy 770 and the International Travel Guidelines;
- i] that a letter be signed by each parent granting permission for their child to travel out-of-the-country with another specifically named adult;
- that each student be in possession of one of the following documents: birth certificate, passport, Consular Report of Birth Abroad, Naturalization Certificate or Canadian Citizenship Card;
- k) that each parent be given a copy of the letter from Dr. Grant Henderson, Superintendent, re: measles immunization.
