BACKGROUND

The Alberta Education assurance survey replaced the accountability pillar surveys in 2021. Many of the measures overlap with the previous survey and some measures are new (indicated in the summaries). Surveys were administered to: students in grades four, seven and ten; students in grades four through nine (small schools);

parents of students in grades four, seven and ten; and all teachers.

Each year, these results are used by schools and the school division to develop our assurance plans and school goals found on each school's website.

Commentary and Analysis: Our citizenship measure result remains fairly consistent with past results. We received a higher than usual result from parents last year which impacted our overall result. When we look at this closer we see the greatest variance occur at the junior high level. At the system level we have responded by streamlining and coordinating some of division supports such as mental health capacity building, school counsellors and FSLWs to deliver related programming to junior high students. Individual schools also respond to their data. For example, Alexandra Middle School has implemented school wide programming around the core values of "Respect, Courage and Integrity" as they have identified these as supporting students in becoming excellent citizens.

Commentary and Analysis: A celebration for our high schools this past year has been an increase in our completion rates across the board. We believe the first key factor is that guidance counsellors and administrators have altered some strategies at their schools to ensure more and more students are staying on the graduation track. The particularly strong 3-year completion rate would indicate how successfully they have been in this area. A second factor could be the impact of the pandemic which has seen students staying closer to home, finishing school before taking employment and not completing high school.

Commentary and Analysis: We have once again achieved a very high result in the Education Quality measure. We are particularly proud of the significant improvements our parents have noted over the past two years, assurance that we believe is being generated through the hard work of our staff and students. This "hard work" can be highlighted by some of the professional development work in the "in-service" jurisdiction table below. It can also be highlighted in the work teachers and administrators have done over the last 3 years with regard to something we call "generative dialogue" or inquiry questions. This approach to professional learning has supported in Teacher Growth, Supervision, and Evaluation Policy, and has helped foster collaboration and reflective practice at each of our schools. Similar to the province we experienced a slight decline in satisfaction rates in this measure. The past year and a half has forced schools and school systems to take many substantial actions in terms of delivery of learning, access to schools and has, in some ways, fundamental changed how we interact. It is unsurprising that parents might feel somewhat less satisfied with their involvement in decision making as the pandemic has made many of the decisions for us. To support this work, we have engaged with our parents and our schools to hear what it is specifically that they have missed and wished we could bring back to schools. We've also asked them, what has worked and what we need to keep. This local assurance work as allowed schools to start planning for ways that they can, for example, engage school councils both in person and by technology. It's created greater flexibility for things like parent teacher interviews and student led conferences, but has also reenforced the importance of connection.
